



The WAMU *Youth Voices* project trains young people to write and produce radio stories about issues important to youth. Each participant will produce a story for air on WAMU's website and, if approved, on WAMU Radio (88.5 FM).

Workshops will take place at WAMU. Students will learn to use radio recording equipment, do interviews, and write a radio story. All necessary equipment is provided and there is no fee.

Group workshops will be held each Monday in (Exact date & times TBA). Students will also be expected to meet one-on-one with the project leader or an assigned mentor for an additional two hours each week. Each student's individual "work day" will be determined at the start of the session.
